

FATHER POTHIN'S WEEKLY REFLECTION

"Ecclesia." What is the church? Who makes its rules?

Last Sunday, confused, anxious and troubled by the news of Jesus' departure, the disciples asked what that meant. What will we do without Him?

In the Gospel today, Jesus answers, saying that "The Holy Spirit, Whom the Father will send in My name, will teach you everything." In other words, they need not worry, but trust that Jesus' physical absence gives place to the Real Presence of the Holy Spirit.

The understanding of the physical absence of Jesus as the Real Presence of the Holy Spirit has been both a gift and a challenge to the early Christian community. It is a gift because Jesus' presence continues through that of the Holy Spirit. It is a challenge because the disciples did not fully understand this kind of language that defined their Lord's physical absence by the Real Presence of the one He sends, the Holy Spirit, the Comforter.

This means that God, not the apostles or their successors, is the head of the church. Church authorities are simply deputies or representatives of Jesus Christ. It took time and prayers for the disciples to understand this theology and ecclesiology. Two thousand twenty-four (2024) years after, we; continue to experience the same difficulties in understanding the true nature and meaning of the "ecclesia" (church). What is the church? Who makes its rules?

Saint James responds directly by saying that the Church is not a human-made organization, even though it is visibly run by humans. "Ecclesia" means called together from somewhere, put "aside." But called by whom? Put aside by whom? By the great I AM Who called Abraham our Father to leave his nation and to go form a new nation of believers...put aside by the same God who for centuries pulled prophets out of their surroundings and ordained them to shepherd His flocks. Ecclesia's members are called by the same Almighty who sent Moses to Pharaoh with a command to free his people.

As you see, we are all called by the same vineyard owner, Christ, the chief Cornerstone. The Archbishop/Metropolitan is called, the College of Bishops is called, the Bishop Ordinary is called, the Rector is called, the Vestry is called, each member of the congregation is individually called. As the Church Fathers said, "In the house of the Lord, the Church, there is only one Boss; His physical absence is a true testimony of His Real Presence."

Old Testament Readings for The Fourth Sunday After Easter

II Esdras 2:42-47

(KJV Bible)

- 42 I Esdras saw upon the mount Sion a great people, whom I could not number, and they all praised the Lord with songs.
- 43 And in the midst of them there was a young man of a high stature, taller than all the rest, and upon every one of their heads he set crowns, and was more exalted; which I marvelled at greatly.
- 44 So I asked the angel, and said, Sir, what are these?
- 45 He answered and said unto me, These be they that have put off the mortal clothing, and put on the immortal, and have confessed the name of God: now are they crowned, and receive palms.
- 46 Then said I unto the angel, What young person is it that crowneth them, and giveth them palms in their hands?

Epistle reading for Second Mass of the Dead

2 Maccabees 12:42-45

(PAM pg H4/KJV Bible)

- 42 Betook themselves unto prayer, and besought him that the sin committed might wholly be put out of remembrance. Besides, that noble Judas exhorted the people to keep themselves from sin, forsomuch as they saw before their eyes the things that came to pass for the sins of those that were slain.
- 43 And when he had made a gathering throughout the company to the sum of two thousand drachms of silver, he sent it to Jerusalem to offer a sin offering, doing therein very well and honestly, in that he was mindful of the resurrection:
- <u>44</u> For if he had not hoped that they that were slain should have risen again, it had been superfluous and vain to pray for the dead.
- 45 And also in that he perceived that there was great favour laid up for those that died godly, it was an holy and good thought. Whereupon he made a reconciliation for the dead, that they might be delivered from sin.

St. John 6:51-54

(PAM pg H6/KJV Bible)

- 51 I am the living bread which came down from heaven: if any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever: and the bread that I will give is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world.
- <u>52</u> The Jews therefore strove among themselves, saying, How can this man give us <u>his</u> flesh to eat?
- 53_ Then Jesus said unto them, <u>Verily</u>, <u>Verily</u>, <u>I say unto you</u>, <u>Except ye eat the flesh</u> of the Son of man, and drink his blood, ye have no life in you.
- 54 Whoso eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, hath eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day.

The WHY Series

WHY the disciples had to wait so long?

Would the disciples have accomplished anything without the Holy Spirit? No. Will we?

That question needs to ring continually in our ears because we Christians are usually highly motivated self-starters. If we weren't, we probably wouldn't have gotten past all the obstacles there are to involvement in evangelism. Because we're highly motivated we look ahead. We try to see the "bigger picture" and we try to achieve long lists of objectives.

We face great temptations to take off on our own power and then wind up asking the Lord to bless activities we've already got going and plans we've already laid out. We almost seem to fear that "waiting" on the Spirit is irresponsible.

In the light of the post resurrections appearances, that's getting things a bit backward, isn't it? Isn't looking to God for power and wisdom and direction the first thing we're supposed to be doing? Why would we dare attempt to do anything until He has made good on His promise of "power from on high"?

What great imagery the phrase "clothed with power" gives us. We wouldn't walk outside on an extremely cold day without winter clothing. We wouldn't walk into a high-paying job interview without giving thought to what we should be wearing. So, why would we dare attempt to do ministry without being "clothed with power from on high"?

These waiting days were necessary to enable the disciples to realize their need, their nothingness, their failure and their dependence upon the Master. They had to get emptied first before they would get filled.

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
